

 - Top bar has tab to "add provider" or "add locator to your site"




Greater Than HIV Services Locator


- Search by Zip Code --> the sites

MedImpact Kentucky Formulary

- Emtricitabine/Tenofovir Disoproxil Fumarate (TDF) Truvada[®]
 - No PA needed for generic
- Descovy[®] Emtricitabine/Tenofovir alafenamide (TAF)
 - PA needed see criteria on next slide
- Apretude[®] Cabotegravir
 - PA needed
 - Currently no set criteria







Access to Care – Kentucky Medicaid

Kentucky Medicaid MedImpact Prior Authorization Criteria (As of July 6, 2023)

Agent(s) Subject to PA Criteria	Criteria for Approval
Descovy* CC, QL	Treatment of HIV Infection
	Length of Authorization: 1 year
	 Diagnosis of human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) infection (ICD-10 = B20 and/or Z21).
	Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis
	Length of Authorization: 3 months
	 Prescribed for pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) of HIV; AND
	Prescriber submits prior authorization request; AND
	Prescriber attests that:
	 Patient is considered high-risk for HIV infection; AND
	 Risk-reduction and medication adherence counseling were performed; AND
	Negative HIV-1 test immediately prior to initiating; AND
	 For Descovy®, member is NOT a recipient of vaginal sex (not FDA-approved in this population).
	Renewal Criteria
	Negative HIV-1 test prior to renewal; AND
	Patient remains at high risk for HIV infection.

- Gilead Advancing Access® Medication Copay Coupon Card
 - \$7200 max per year
 - No income limit
 - Re-apply annually
 - Patients are not eligible if they have state/federally funded prescription drug coverage (i.e. Medicare, Medicaid)
 - Online enrollment process
 - Descovy® and Truvada®

ViiVConnect

- For Patients | ViiVConnect
 - \$7850 max per year
 - Includes \$350 per year for injection administration
 - Re-apply annually
 - Patients are not eligible if they have state/federally funded prescription drug coverage (i.e. Medicare, Medicaid)
 - Online enrollment process
 - Apretude®

Access to Care – Medicare Insured, Copay Assistance

Patient Advocate Foundation (PAF)

- For Commercial and Medicare insurance
- \$7500 max per year
- Income limit < 400% FPL
 - HHS 1 \$58,320
 - HHS 2 \$78,880
 - HHS 3 \$99,440
- Re-apply annually
- Enrollment dependent on funding, limitations apply
- Descovy[®] and Truvada[®]

Patient Access Network (PAN)

- \$3600 max per year
- Income limit < 500% FPL
 - HHS 1 \$72,900
 - HHS 2 \$98,600
 - HHS 3 \$124,300
- Re-apply annually
- Enrollment dependent on funding, limitations apply
- Currently on Wait-list for Descovy[®],
 Truvada[®] and Apretude[®]



- ☐ Can you prescribe PrEP for me here?
- ☐ Are there ways to help me to pay for PrEP if I need assistance?
- Are you willing to prescribe and manage PrEP for me?
- ☐ How often will I have to be tested for HIV and other STDs?

Additional questions for women:

- ☐ Can PrEP help me to get pregnant safely if my partner has HIV?
- ☐ Can I take PrEP if I am pregnant or breastfeeding?

What is PrEP?

PrEP stands for "pre-exposure prophylaxis".

Taking a daily dose of Truvada** was approved in July 2012 for reducing the chance of getting HIV infection in people who don't have HIV.

When used with other safer sex practices (like condoms), PrEP can help protect you from getting HIV from an infected partner.

Truvada** can be used for HIV prevention by men who have sex with men, men who have sex with women, women who have sex with men, and injection drug users.

HOW TO TALK TO YOUR DOCTOR ABOUT PrEP



Before Your Visit

Make an appointment with your health care provider. Your doctor can help you to decide if PrEP would be a good choice for you.

Do research. Make a list of reasons that you think that PrEP would be a good choice for you.

Think about your routine, especially things that might make it easy or hard to take a daily medication.

Make a health history list for your doctor. That includes any past illnesses or concerns you have, as well as a list of your current medications (including supplements, herbs, etc.).

Make sure a translator is available or bring someone who can translate if you would prefer to speak a language other than English during your appointment.

During Your Visit

Be clear. Take out your notes and tell your doctor that you are interested in PrEP right away.

Do not be shy. Give your doctor all the details about your life that could be important to your health. Don't worry about being judged.

If your sex life is a hard topic to talk about, say that to your doctor. It will help to start the conversation.

Ask questions. You want to be sure that you understand what your doctor is telling you.

Take notes during your visit so that you can remember what your doctor said.

After Your Visit

Review your notes or any information provided by your doctor.

Consider your options. Your doctor gave you a lot of information. Now it is up to you to make the right decision for you. http://www.cdc.gov/hiv/risk/behavior/index.html

Call your doctor if you have more questions. Ask to speak to a nurse if your doctor is unavailable.

Schedule tests or follow-up appointments your doctor requested.

Get your results if you had tests done at your appointment.

If you feel comfortable, you may want to discuss this choice with your partners, family, or friends.


